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Subject Overview	One of Australia's greatest tourism assets is its unique and diverse natural landscapes. This subject provides a geographic introduction to the basic components of these landscapes including their unique flora and fauna and the climate and landforms that have influenced their distribution. Cultural factors that have shaped these landscapes are also explored. Field studies are a key component of the subject and provide students with an opportunity to apply many of the theoretical concepts discussed.
