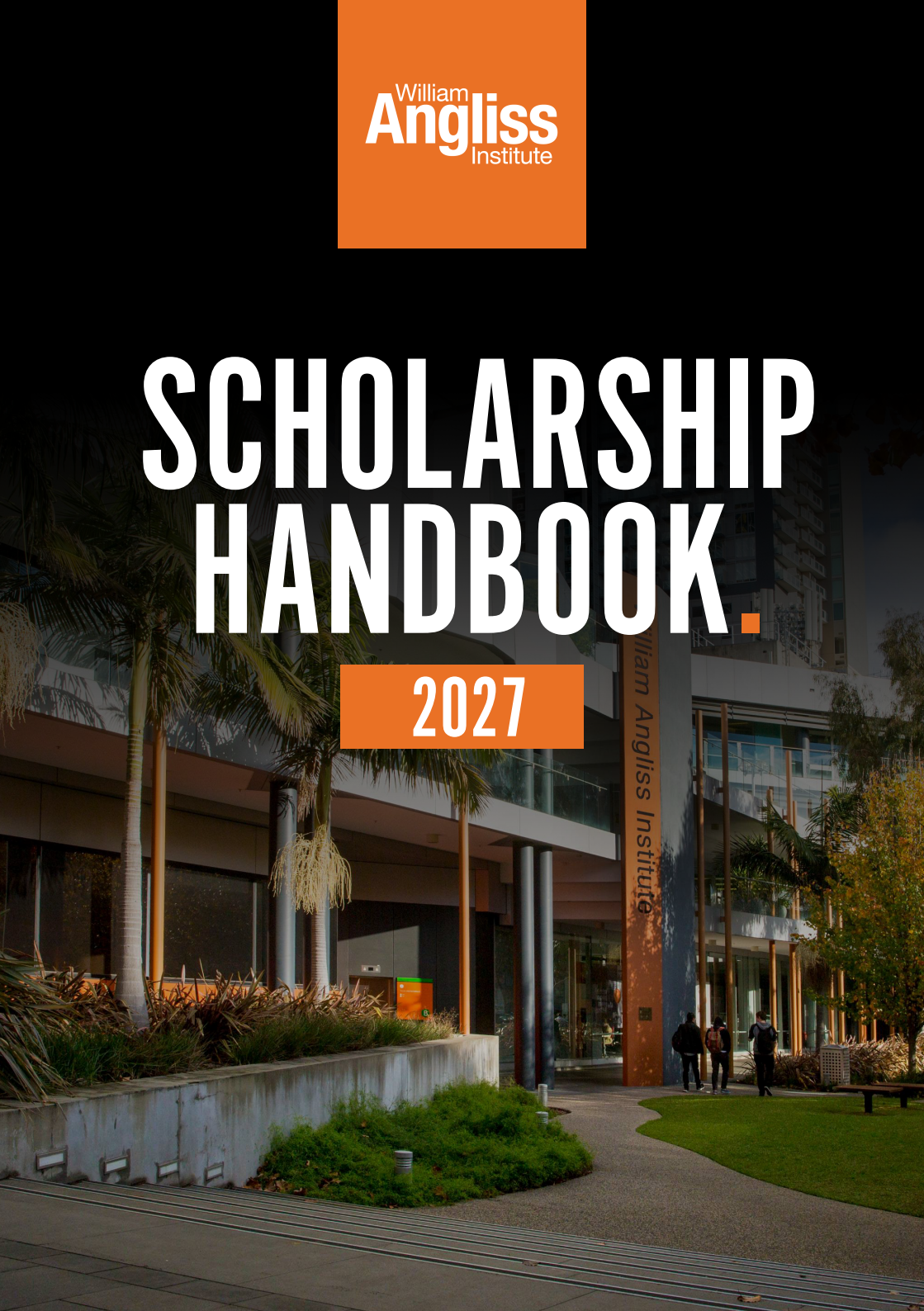

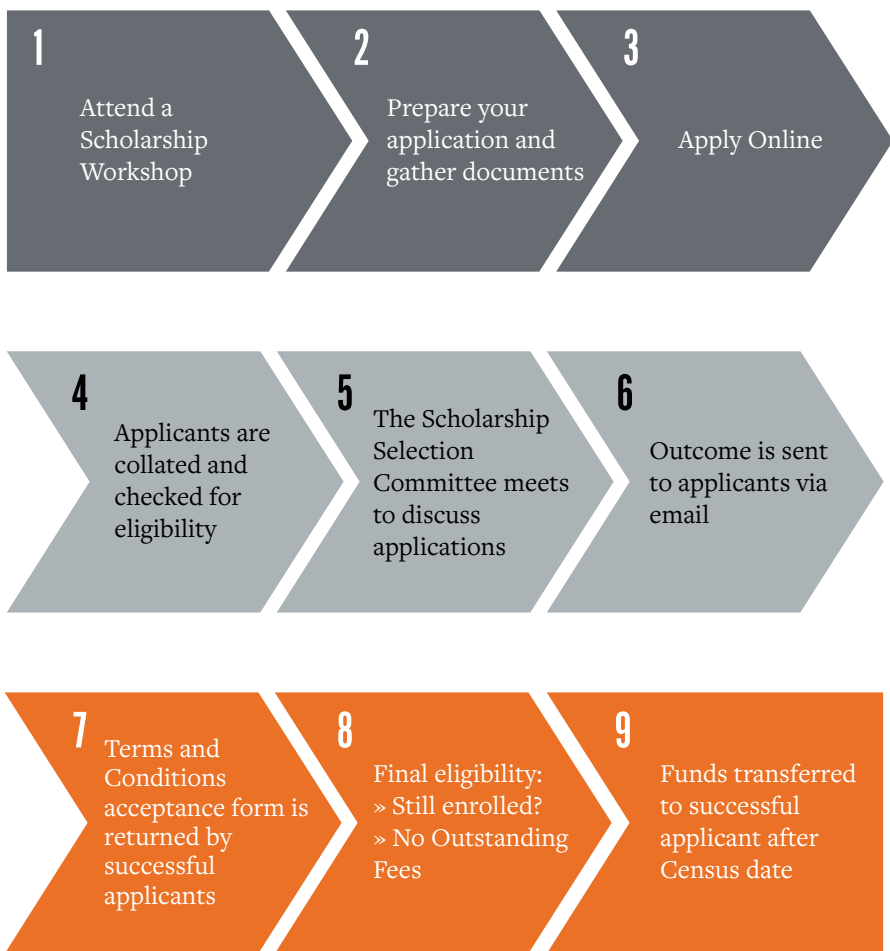

APPLICATION

APPLICATION FORMS.

There are three application forms. You can apply through one or more, depending on your circumstances.



MERIT

Merit scholarships are available for applicants who wish to be recognised for their academic achievements and leadership within the Institute and across the community.

If you're interested in applying for a scholarship awarded through merit, keep an eye out for the yellow!

EQUITY

Equity scholarships are available for applicants who have experienced, or are experiencing, financial and/or educational disadvantage.

If you're interested in applying for a scholarship awarded through equity, keep an eye out for the green!

ABORIGINAL AND/OR TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER

This category is available for applicants who identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander.

If you identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander, keep an eye out for the maroon!



Each category has its own form and application requirements! You can apply for a scholarship through multiple categories.

APPLYING THROUGH MERIT.

At William Angliss Institute, we define merit as:

Demonstrate academic excellence via results achieved during previous and current studies.

REQUIREMENTS

To apply for merit, you require the following documents:

- An updated resumé (see pp. 15)
- Two letters of support (pp.8-10):
 - One letter from an academic contact
 - One letter from an external source
- Academic Transcript (see p. 17)

STATEMENTS

To apply for merit, you are required to write four statements, no more than 200 words each.

You'll be asked to answer the following:

- Why have you chosen to undertake your course of study, and what are your longterm career goals?
- Discuss your academic performance and achievements in your studies.
- Provide an example of when you have demonstrated leadership skills in your studies and professional life.
- How do you intend to use the scholarship funds?



Use your statements to set yourself apart from the other applicants. See p. 17 for more tips on writing your applicant statements!

LETTERS OF SUPPORT.

You require two supporting letters for your scholarship application.

These letters must be current and official:

- Include letterhead where possible
- Contact details of your referee (name, signature, contact number and/or email)
- Dated within three months of your application

ACADEMIC

Your academic support letter should come from a contact within an educational setting. Most applicants ask a staff member at the Institute.

This letter should demonstrate your willingness to learn and engagement within the classroom.

EXTERNAL

Your external support letter should come from a contact that can demonstrate your community involvement and/or leadership achievements.

Most applicants choose to ask their employer, but you can also attain a letter from a community worker, counselor, church leader, doctor, etc.



See pp. 9–10 for an example of what your academic/external reference can comment on.

TIP: *Make your letter stand-out! Try not to follow the example too closely.*

Include letterhead (if possible), email and/or phone number.

APPLYING THROUGH EQUITY.

At William Angliss Institute, we define equity as:

Demonstrate financial and/or education disadvantage.

CRITERIA

To apply for equity, you must fit under one, or more, of the following categories:

- Experience, or have experienced financial hardship
(see p. 12)
- Are from, or are intending to move from, a rural or regional area
(see p. 13)
- Have disability, long-term medical illness or mental health condition
(see p. 13)
- Experience difficult circumstances
(see p. 13)

REQUIREMENTS

Your application requirements depend on the equity criteria that you apply through.

Regardless of the criteria that you're applying through, you still require an Academic Transcript (p. 17) and resumé. (p. 15)

STATEMENTS

To apply for equity, you are required to write at least three statements, no more than 200 words each. Other criteria may require you to write additional statements

You'll be asked to answer the following:

- Why have you chosen to undertake your course of study, and what are your longterm career goals?
- Discuss your academic performance and achievements in your studies.
- How do you intend to use the scholarship funds?



You should use your statements to set yourself apart from the other applicants. See p. 17 for more tips on writing your applicant statements!

CRITERIA.

FINANCIAL HARDSHIP

If you are experiencing financial hardship then you can apply for equity through this criterion.

We understand that financial hardship can impact international and domestic students differently, so there are different application requirements for both international and domestic students.

DOMESTIC STUDENTS

General Financial Hardship:

Domestic students applying through this criterion must:

- Select your current living situation (living independently; supported by parents/spouse; other)
- Provide a copy of your ATO income statement for the most recent financial year
- Write a statement that details your current financial and living circumstances including how they are affecting your study

Centrelink Benefits:

If you are also receiving Centrelink benefits, then you can include this in your application. To include this, you must:

- Outline which benefit you are currently receiving
- Provide supporting documentation to prove that you are receiving this benefit

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

International students applying through this criterion must:

- One to three of your most recent payslips
- A copy of your bank statement
- Any additional supporting documentation
- Write a statement that details your current financial and living circumstances including how they are affecting your study

DISABILITY, LONG-TERM MEDICAL OR MENTAL HEALTH CONDITION

If you have a disability, long-term medical or mental health condition that impacts your ability to study, then you can apply through this category.

To apply for this, you must:

- Outline which disability, medical illness or mental health condition(s) you are living with
- Write a statement detailing how your condition affect your ability to participate in your course
- Provide a current detailed letter from a local medical health provider, or evidence disability payments

EXPERIENCE DIFFICULT CIRCUMSTANCES

Sometimes, difficult circumstances don't fit into neat categories. If something you are facing is having a negative impact on your education and you wish for it to be considered as part of your scholarship application, you can provide a document as evidence.

To apply for this category, you must:

- Write a statement that describes your circumstances
- Provide one to two supporting documents

FROM A RURAL, REGIONAL, OR INTERSTATE AREA

If you are from, or intending to move from, a rural, regional or interstate address, then you can apply for equity through this category.

Although there is no remoteness requirement, the Committee will consider the 2021 ASGS remoteness of your address.

If you have moved within the last two years. To apply for this, you must:

- Provide evidence of your current address
- Provide evidence your previous address
- Outline when you moved

If you are planning to move. To apply for this, you must:

- Provide evidence of your current address that demonstrates that you are from a rural, regional, or interstate area

SOME SPECIFICS.

CENTRELINK DOCUMENTS

Centrelink documents must include:

- Your name
- Date
- Address
- Date of birth

You can include a Centrelink income statement or card. Use whichever Centrelink proof you believe will best reflect your circumstances.

RURAL OR REGIONAL LIVING

If you've already moved within the last two years, you must provide proof of previous address (e.g. a copy of a utility bill, or a rental agreement demonstrating when you moved in).

If you're planning to move, you must provide evidence of current address (e.g. a copy of a recent utility bill, or a rental agreement).

BANK STATEMENTS

If you are an international student applying through financial hardship, then you must provide a bank statement. Only the front page is requirement. Screenshots are not accepted.

RESUMÉ.

Your resumé can make or break your scholarship application! Ensure that you can provide an up-to-date and professional-looking resume with your application that can effectively demonstrate your work experience to date.

A professional-looking resumé is a marketing tool that job seekers use to communicate their value to employers. It should clearly outline your experience, qualifications and achievements.

A resume is effective if the recruiter/ employer chooses you over the other candidates (at least for an interview).



Our careers counselor can help you with your resumé! If you have any doubts about your resumé, or what to include in it, it is strongly recommended that you reach out to our careers counselor.

ABORIGINAL AND/OR TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER.

If you identify as an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander, you can apply for a scholarship through this category.

REQUIREMENTS

To apply for an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander scholarship, you require the following:

- Academic Transcript (see p. 17)
- An updated resumé (see pp. 15)
- EITHER:
 - Proof of Aboriginality; OR
 - Letter of support from Koorie Liaison Officer

STATEMENTS

To apply for merit, you are required to write three statements, no more than 200 words each.

You'll be asked to answer the following:

- Why have you chosen to undertake your course of study, and what are your longterm career goals?
- Discuss your academic performance and achievements in your studies.
- How do you intend to use the scholarship funds?

ACADEMIC TRANSCRIPT.

Your academic transcript is your record of study at William Angliss Institute. You are required to provide your academic transcript for both merit and equity applications.

You can attain your unofficial transcript from your E-Student or our Information Centre.

If you have recently started studying at the Institute, and your final results are yet to be released, then you can collate evidence of your current results.

Academic transcripts from the Institute are preferred if they're available; however, if you are yet to start your studies at William Angliss Institute, then you can provide your academic results from another educational setting instead (e.g. school report, previous academic transcript etc.).



If you are a current student, you can download your current results from eStudent via MyWAI.

WRITING YOUR STATEMENT.

Your applicant statements are your opportunity to explain your situation to the committee assessing your application. The panel assessing your application wants to get to know you and get an idea of who you are.

You should consider the following when writing your statements:

- What sets you apart from your peers?
- What are your goals? What path are your studies taking you on?
- Why do you need or deserve the scholarship?
- Why you?

While your statements should indicate that you have invested time and effort into your application, each statement should not exceed 200 words.



Your written statements are your only opportunity to 'speak' to the Scholarship Selection Committee. Make sure that you are presenting yourself the best you can!

STANDARD OF EVIDENCE.

Your documentation provided should reasonably 'prove' your situation.

Any document you provide should be current. This means that it should be dated within the last three months. The only exception to this is rural/regional documentation, which can be dated within the last two years (see p.13).

Here are some general rules to ensure that your documentation is reliable and verifiable:

- It should be written by someone in a position of authority (not yourself or a family member/friend) who is qualified to comment on your circumstances, i.e. teacher, lawyer/accountant/health care provider
- Preferably as specific as possible
- Dated
- Either on official letterhead or containing an original signature
- All documentation must be written in English, from an Australian source



CHECKLIST.

I'm applying for merit:

- Resumé
- Academic letter of support
- External letter of support
- Academic transcript

I'm applying for equity:

- Academic transcript
- Resumé

Financial Hardship (International student):

- 1-3 of most recent payslips
- Copy of bank statement
- Any additional supporting documentation (if relevant)

Financial Hardship (Domestic student):

- ATO income statement
- Evidence of Centrelink benefit (if relevant)

Rural, Regional or Interstate:

- Evidence of current address
- Evidence of previous address (I've moved within the last 2 years)

Disability, Long-term Medical or Mental Health Condition:

- Current, detailed letter from medial health provider
- Evidence of disability payments (if relevant)

I'm applying for an Indigenous scholarship:

- Document (proof of Aboriginality OR letter of support)



You don't need to apply for every equity sub-category.

Apply for whichever areas you believe reflect your situation.

Note: you'll also need to complete your statements for each application.
